Loggerhead Shrikes impale (hook onto something) their prey to assist them in eating, as shrike feet are not strong enough to grasp their prey while eating. Male shrikes will return in the spring first and display impalements to attract a mate by showing off their good hunting skills. During the warm May to June breeding season, the diet of shrikes consists mainly of larger insects including grasshoppers and beetles. However, in cold weather or when insects are less available, shrikes will take mice, voles, small snakes, lizards, frogs or occasionally small birds.
